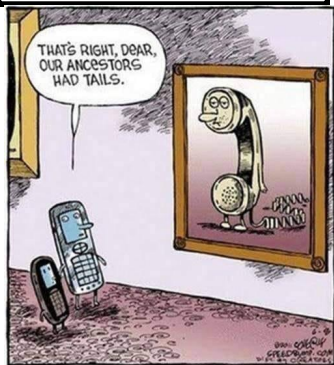

Visit McLean County Museum's Online Exhibits



With closures due to Covid 19, the county museum in the old courthouse on the Bloomington city square decided to make lots more offerings available online at www.mchistory.org. One of our volunteers shared that she visited the site recently and found so many "real gems" that she had to eventually make herself stop. Her new discovery this time was the photo collection given to the museum by the *Pantagraph newspaper* several years ago. The oldest ones from the 1930's and 40's have been digitized and added to the Illinois Secretary of State's Digital Collection which can be freely accessed and searched by the public at www.idaillinois.org. Bill Kemp's Sunday article in the Dec. 13 *Pantagraph* was about Christmas in the Depression and was illustrated with a photo and details of the collection.. In my search of the collection I found this photo of Durwood West as a per-

former back in 1939 at the Gym Circus, an annual event produced by students at Lexington High School. He is the uncle of one of our local volunteers, so I couldn't resist sharing this image.

To easily find the photo collection, go to the museum site and click on RESEARCH. Then click on RESOURCES to find the **Pantagraph Negative Collection**. Each group of photos can be accessed by subject, date, or alphabetically. So far, they have digitized collections for 1930 to 1939, 1940 to 45, and 1946 to 1949. (They have 80,000 photos through 2000!) These photos were taken for a story, and the entire set has been published when, at the time of the story in the paper, only one of the photos might have appeared in print. Many have names, dates, and place ID. Some are labeled unknown but often photos in the set relate. There are also many other wonderful offerings on this site that we are sure will bring you back for more visits to our McLean County Museum. Enjoy!



Did You Know...The 5 mile area around Lexington has at least 9 cemeteries! Pleasant Hill Cemetery has the earliest documented burial—1829 for the burial of the Foster children. The next burial was in Dawson Cemetery in Lexington Township in 1831—with a readable tombstone for Elizabeth Bartholomew Epler that's still there to prove it! Many Kickapoo Indians and pioneers lived and died in this area and their burials were noted in oral histories, too. If you have relatives buried in the Lexington area, you will want to read the illustrated histories of each Lexington cemetery on our updated web page.

THE FORT: Web Page Updates...if you remember our webpage from the early days of internet outreach, it was filled with lots of historical information and presented a monthly article to entice readership by our members and those who scrolled the internet.
