Elmo F. Hill Post 291 Lexington American Legion commemorates Memorial Day by placing over 600 American flags in our six local cemeteries - Lexington, Pleasant Hill, Scrogin, Clarksville, Dawson, and Lawndale - a tribute from the community to those veterans' service to our country. The post has lost 20 members over the last two years and they will be especially honoring those past members.
